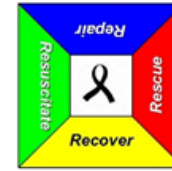

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Statement of Need

Trauma is the leading cause of death for children and adults ages 1-44 more than stroke and AIDS combined. Thirty Five million people are treated each year for traumatic injuries. While most injuries can be treated at a local community emergency department, if you are severely injured, getting care at a Level I trauma center can lower your risk of death by 25 percent. Conversely, nearly 1 in 4 patients is more likely to die when not initially taken to a Level I trauma center. Less than 10% of hospitals have a Level I or II trauma center and only 8 states have fully developed trauma systems. Traumatic injury in the geriatric population is increasing in prevalence and is associated with higher mortality and complication rates compared with younger patients. The elderly are currently estimated to be 12% of the population in the United States and in NYC 16.2%. In patients over 80 years, trauma center mortality was 8% as compared to 56% in non-trauma centers. This conference will provide an opportunity to focus on the care and community support a Level I Trauma Center provides to their patients and why providing this level of care to our community improves patient education and outcomes.

Target Audience

Physicians, physician assistants, residents, interns, medical students, nurse practitioners, nurses, prehospital providers and other health care professionals involved in care of trauma patients.

Educational Objectives

It is intended that this NYPQ CME activity will lead to improved patient care. At the conclusion of this symposium, the participant will be able to:

- Apply knowledge of resources available in a Level I Trauma Center and in the within the community.
- Develop a plan to as to the need for a geriatric patient to be transported or transferred to a Level I Trauma Center.
- Identify the data resources available for Performance Improvement, Research and Guideline Development
- Evaluate resources vs. the needs of the traumatically injured patient.
- Analyze outcomes in patient care, community understanding and provider understanding of a Level I Trauma Center.
- Explain the need for Level I Trauma Centers in a community and what it has to offer to patients, families, providers in terms of patient care, facility resources, community outreach and pre-hospital decision making through “Rescue to Recovery”.

NewYork-Presbyterian Queens is located on the corner of Booth Memorial Avenue and Main Street in Flushing. *From the Long Island Expressway:* take the Main Street Exit 23, travel north on Main Street to Booth Memorial Avenue. *From the Whitestone Bridge:* take the Van Wyck Expressway to the College Point Blvd. Exit; turn left on College Point Blvd. and right on Booth Memorial Avenue. Follow Booth Memorial Avenue to Main Street. *From the IRT Flushing Line #7:* train to Main Street (last stop), then Q44 bus southbound on Main Street; stops opposite the Hospital. NYPQ is located in a residential area with metered parking. Free lock-and-park spaces are available under the Van Wyck Expressway at College Point Blvd. and 58th Road. Shuttle buses to the Hospital run approximately every 10-15 minutes. Limited paid parking is available in our Visitor Parking Lot located on Booth Memorial Avenue, opposite the NYPQ Emergency Room.
